Nursing Workforce

How Oregon Ranks for Nurses: Popular news outlet WalletHub published its <u>2024 list of the "Best and Worst States for Nurses,"</u> ranking Oregon sixth in the nation. The list analyzed nursing wages, job opportunities, and more.

National COVID-19 Reporting: Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) and the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) seek public input on continued reporting efforts of COVID-19 cases in acute care. You can <u>submit your comments online</u> until June 10.

Nursing Education

Nursing Faculty Shortage and Wages: Huddlers discussed the continued shortage of nurse faculty, citing the pay gap is a known barrier to filling critical educational roles. OSBN addressed the topic at <u>last month's public meeting</u> and continues its analysis of data reported by Oregon nursing programs and other state data sources such as OLDC. OCN published its own <u>wage study last month</u>, which explored the hourly wages of nursing professionals across practice settings. Attendees agreed that pay is a challenge for educators, some offering anecdotal evidence that they supplemented teaching wages with per diem shifts. Many faculty work on nine or ten-month contracts. In addition, limited staffing makes it difficult for current educators to utilize PTO or sick leave. Finally, Huddlers agreed on the importance of creative solutions to the issue, including evaluating existing models such as physician pay.
