Pertussis on the Rise in Oregon: The Oregon Health Authority warns that <u>more than 825 cases of pertussis</u>, also known as whooping cough, have been recorded in Oregon this year. More than <u>150,000 individuals die globally</u> from the disease each year, according to the WHO. Vaccinations (DTaP and Tdap) protect against pertussis.

Western States Simulation Alliance: The California Simulation Alliance (CSA) invites nursing professionals across Oregon and other western states to get involved as the organization transitions to a new brand, the Western States Simulation Alliance (WSSA), in 2025. WSSA offers nursing simulation curriculum, instructor training, resources, and more. In addition, the organization's annual conference is scheduled for November 7-8, 2025, in San Diego.

Technology's Impact on Healthcare & Nursing: Huddlers explored the growing influence of technology and artificial intelligence on the nursing profession, as well as how it informed the general public's understanding of healthcare topics. New reports suggest that some nursing professionals are <u>pushing back against integrating Al-driven nursing solutions</u>, particularly when they could cause patient safety risks. However, tools like ChatGPT and social media platforms like TikTok have gone mainstream. Huddlers in the education space also pointed out a rise in students relying on Al resources for coursework, which has resulted in misinformation in submitted assignments. Other Huddlers discussed how social media have become go-to sources for news and information. Unfortunately, these sources are not always accurate. Misinformation around topics such as vaccines can lead to mistrust in healthcare, creating tension for nurses trying to honor patient autonomy while addressing inaccurate medical beliefs. Huddlers agreed that technology like Al has benefits but must be used responsibly and double-checked for accuracy.
