Staying Informed in Today's Political Climate: Huddlers mused about the continued rollout of Federal budgetary cuts and how they might impact Oregon's healthcare system. For example, will reductions to the Department of Education affect the number of nurses Oregon schools can train if federal funding and public loan forgiveness are affected? Organizations like the National Council for Nonprofits have prepared independent tools to help inform organizations about current executive orders and their progress. Huddlers agreed that staying informed, advocating in your community, and engaging in productive, respectful conversations are essential during uncertain times. Attendees also agreed about the importance of evaluating the quality of news channels and any potential bias that impacts how news is presented.

Keeping Up-To-Date During Flu Season: The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) reminds Oregonians that it isn't too late to receive your influenza vaccine as the state's flu season rages. In addition, new research from KFF explores how Americans perceive the threat of bird flu.

Promoting Well-Being Within the Healthcare Workforce: Tuesday, March 18, marks the annual Health Workforce Well-Being Day—an opportunity for healthcare employers to recognize the essential act of supporting and promoting well-being amongst their workers. Nursing Education


